

VUSC News Issue Seven

This term our Year 7 to Year 11 students completed their mid year exams. At recent assemblies our Middle and Later Years Engagement Leaders gave very clear advice to students about how to prepare for exams, and about what effective study practices look like.

They were advised about our four key actions for success:

- 1. Complete all of the set work/homework
- 2. Make multiple choice topic/chapter summaries
- 3. Look over their Cornell summary notes
- 4. Do practice test or exam questions

We also encouraged students to see their teachers for extra help and support with their work.

All Year 12 VCE students will be sitting for their 'Practice Exams' in the last week of term

2. We do this early on in the year as it is the most crucial time for all Year 12 students to start putting in extra time and effort to their studies to get the most out their final year at school. It is compulsory that all students who are sitting external exams to attend. A Year 12 exam timetable will be distributed so that all students know when their exams are on.

<u>Semester Reports</u> will be available to parents on Compass from Tuesday 25 June. Bookings are now open for Parent Teacher Interviews to be held on Thursday 27 June. I encourage all parents to make appointments with your child's teachers to discuss their progress. There are no classes on this day as students are required to attend interviews with their parents.

Later Years Expo and Course Counselling

All Year 9, 10 & 11 students will take part in selecting their courses for next year early next term. This is an important time for students' future careers. Each student will have an individual appointment with a course counsellor and we will encourage students and families discuss their preferences before attending the appointment. The Later Years Expo will be held on Monday 29 July at the Senior Campus. More information will be provided to students early next term.

Next term in week 2 we will be receiving a visit from our Chinese sister school again. There will be 20 students and 3 teachers with us for the week. They have been invited to Government House for a Welcome Reception with other Victorian sister schools on Wednesday 24th July, and will spend the rest of the week in classes with our students. We will be holding a farewell assembly at the Junior Campus on Friday 26 July during period 4 which families are invited to attend. I would like to thank the parents and teachers who have volunteered to host the students.

A reminder to the <u>families hosting our sister school students</u> that an information night will be held on Thursday 27 June at 6.00pm at the Junior Campus in the library.

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund provides a payment of \$225 for eligible secondary school students paid directly to the school, to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs for the benefit of the student. Families holding a valid means-tested concession card are eligible to apply, as well as certain students and families who fall into a special consideration category. The GAT (General Achievement Test) was completed on Wednesday 12 June by all students studying a Unit 3/4 subject this year (including language outside the school).

The General Achievement Test is a test of general knowledge and skills in written communication, mathematics, science and technology, humanities, the arts and social sciences taken by all Victorian students prior to completing their VCE.

Achievement on the GAT is a good predictor of achievement on other assessments. If students have done well on the GAT, then their achievements are likely to be high on their school-based and external assessments. Workshops were held during 'CSG sessions' for preparation for the GAT. It provided an opportunity for students to ask questions.

ProjectABLE

Our Year 11 VCAL students were involved in a 3.5 hour workshop on Monday 17 June led by people with a disability. The program aims to build disability awareness in the community and promote social inclusion. The group introduced students to the diversity of roles available in the community care and disability sector which is one of the fastest growing workforces in Australia. Students were given the opportunity to talk to facilitators and do some activities such as sign language and an activity that simulated being blind. The experience was an opportunity to learn from people with disabilities and learn the challenges that they face and experience on a daily basis.

VCAL ... COMMUNITY HEALTH ADVANCEMENT AND STUDENT EDUCATION (CHASE)

CHASE is a community initiative working to improve health through education.

Their goal is to see young people empowered to take control of their own health, to then engage with their local communities to improve health awareness and outcomes. Year 11 VCAL students were given the first of six health education sessions and met their tertiary student mentors. They will continue to have these education sessions during term 3 and then continue with mentors and partnerships with local community organizations and health professionals to improve community health.

The program is being run by a group of students primarily from the University of Melbourne, who will be assigned to the VCAL class for the duration of the year. These volunteers will act as mentors to the students, as positive role models and facilitating groups doing research on Nutrition, Mental Health, Physical Activity, Drugs & Alcohol just to name a few.

Several of our Year 10 students have been involved in the Aspirations Program this year, which is run by ABCN staff and involves business mentors from Hall and Wilcox meeting with our students over a number of sessions. The following table is a summary of the students' rating of the program (1=strongly disagree, 5=agree, 7=strongly agree). These results demonstrate that overall the students gained a lot from the program.

Student Comments

- The most helpful thing I learnt was the wide range of employability skills, ranging from interview skills, to creating a personal brand, everything I learnt was extremely useful.
- I would recommend Aspirations because they allow you to understand the skills you need to bring to a job and build your self-esteem.
- I learnt to know that no matter what you do in life, whether it be making fences or being a lifeguard, there will always be transferable skills that you can apply to your personal brand or resume.
- When I apply for a future job or even university, I will be able to use these skills I have learnt along the way to get into the position desired.
- The most important thing I learned from my mentor is that if I fail in achieving what I want, I can calmly re-evaluate how I failed, to be a better person.
- The best thing I learnt from my mentors was to act confident, and be prepared for a job interview. A personal brand is important.
- Their attitude (mentors) and their passion about their career and their jobs really inspires
 me.
- I would recommend Aspirations because it's good for future school and super fun.
- It (Aspirations) is extremely beneficial, as the majority of these skills aren't necessarily taught at school. More people need to know.
- The mentors were very friendly and relatable. I am comfortable in talking to them about my plans for the future and my current issues in school.

Mentor Comments

- As the sessions went on, students who were quieter at the beginning spoke up more which was nice to see.
- Confidence! They believe in themselves and their abilities.
- Became more chatty and engaged as the weeks went on.

I have a meeting with Tony Macvean, Managing Partner at Hall and Wilcox on Tuesday 18th June to discuss further programs that ABCN could possibly provide to VUSC students.

DET Focus Group (Understanding engagement, disengagement and early school leaving in our school)

The Department has a state-wide, area and local challenge to reduce the number of students leaving school early (and not transitioning into and completing other learning pathways). They have requested to hold two focus groups at our school to hear from students about their

experiences - what is working well, and what we could do to make school more engaging.

The focus groups will be run by a qualified facilitator and led by Ruth Giles, DET Pathways Manager – Brimbank Melton Area next week at the Senior Campus. The 2.5 hour workshops will include VCE and VCAL students from year 11 and year 12. Each student will be encouraged to speak freely, and will not be able to be identified.

From my experience, students usually find experiences such as these empowering – they have a chance to express their opinions, and learn to see things from other's perspectives. I am hoping we will gain some insight as to how to engage disengaged students.

Chinese Museum Excursion

On the 21st of May, our Year 10 and Year 11 Chinese language classes went to the Chinese Museum.

Students developed their understanding on the history of Chinese Australian's lifestyle and settlement in the last 200 years. They also learned the cultural and technological development and economic wealth through the remarkable people and great innovations of Chinese Han Dynasty. *Mr Ding and Miss Wang*

On the 21st of May, the Year 10 and 11 Chinese class with Miss Wang and Mr Ding went to the Museum of Chinese Australian History. It was really interesting as I was able to learn a lot about the Chinese immigrant story in the 1800s, prior to the gold rushes. We also learnt about some of the

famous inventions of the Han Dynasty, such as the Seismometer. In the underground floor, we were able to experience what it was like to be on a boat from China to Australia during the 17th century. There, we also saw a really long millennium dragon they use during Chinese New Year as well as the Moomba Festival. The weight of the dragon head alone is 200kg and requires eight people to hold it! I recommend this museum to anyone who would be interested in learning about the Chinese lifestyle and culture in Melbourne.

What impressed me the most was the rich-cultural atmosphere of the museum. The museum is divided into four levels. Each layer represents a different topic. The famous sayings of Confucius on level three made me think about our learning experiences.

There are several copies of his famous sayings in the museum, for example, "to learn without thinking is to be reckless, but to think without learning is perilous." On the 21st of May, year 10 and year 11 students went to the Chinese museum in China town. While we were there, we visited the top level and there was some

information about the history of Chinese immigrants and how they had come over to Australia. As well there were ingredients to create Chinese medicine.


Year 9 and Year 10 students who are interested in joining our Rugby League Academy in 2020 are invited to attend the Rugby League Academy Information Evening on:
